City Council Meeting Highlights from 3/24/25

- The head of the Library, Jean Thiessen inquired about what is the proper rules and procedures to bring in a food truck for events to help plan her upcoming summer event.
- The council approved of her bringing in the Sage & Juliette Coffee Co. truck for her June event and plans to discuss further policies and needs concerning the question of permitting Food Trucks within the city.
- City Engineer, Chris Young reported to the council his findings that the current lift station is at its limit and the city needs to start planning for a new station, one correctly made for the city as well as ability to upgrade as the city does. More data and planning must happen along with budgeting and looking for grant money.
- Financial Report presented by City Treasurer, Terry Ullum.
- Officer Moore reports talking with pet owners about their responsibility to have their animals under control and contained either by a fence, leash or tether. Owners allowing their animals to roam beyond their homes will be fined.
- The city clerk thanked the council for approving the new website for the city. It has the same address but already has so much more information for everyone. Morrow encourages everyone to check it out. **whitewaterks.gov**
- Maintenance reports that KWRA assisted in resolving a Lagoon blockage. Once the weather gets better they will resume marking parking areas for the Business District.
- The city has hired Jake Callstrom to be our Animal Control Officer. If you need to reach him the email is: animalcontrol@whitewaterks.gov or call or email the office.
- Firework stand permits were discussed.
- Street maintenance plans for the year were discussed. Discussion on Slurry vs. Repairs, or creating a plan to alternate years; final vote will be made at the next meeting.

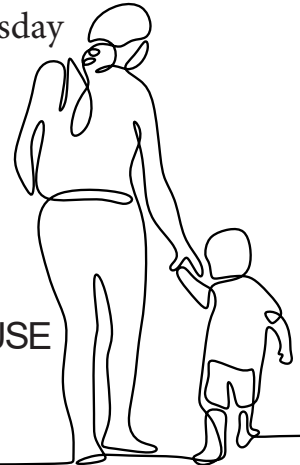

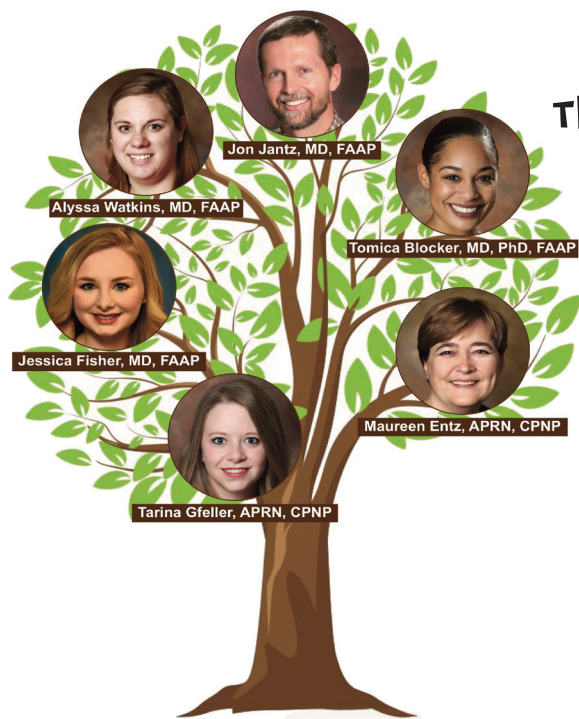
In addition, a mid-afternoon break for refreshments at the Branding Iron Café and a walk around downtown will cap the day.

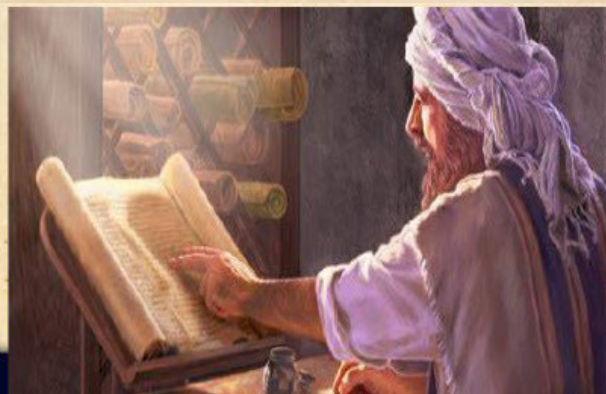

FUN IN THE SUN

Time outdoors has countless benefits for physical and mental health. Many people enjoy sports or engage in activities to improve their health. Time spent outdoors is known to help relieve stress, anxiety, and boost feelings of happiness and wellbeing. With these benefits of outdoors being well known to many, some may not know how to enjoy the outdoors while practicing sun safety.

Sun safety is important to reduce your risk of skin cancer. One in five Americans will develop skin cancer in their

lifetime and nearly 20 Americans die every day from melanoma. Everyone is at risk for skin cancer, no matter their age, skin color, or gender.

Some helpful everyday preventative measures for practicing sun safety are to stay indoors or in shade between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. when UV rays are strongest: Wearing UPF protective clothing, wide-brimmed hats, UV sunglasses, sunscreen, Seeking shade. Knowing these preventive measures is helpful, but other questions may come to mind as you prepare to be sun safe.

What about Vitamin D?

Strive to focus on foods rich in vitamin D. If you are unsure about your vitamin D levels, talk with your physician about having your levels checked through a blood test.

Is my sunscreen safe to store in a vehicle?

According to the Food and Drug Administration, when exposed to heat, the preservatives found in sunscreen break down, allowing bacteria and fungi to grow faster.

I apply a moisturizer with SPF each morning, am I covered?

Many moisturizers or foundation now have SPF ratings, but it's important to note that these do not protect all day. Just like sunscreen, to remain protected, you will need to reapply throughout the day.

Should I visit a dermatologist or my physician?

Many physicians will check the body during annual exams or when asked to do so. A physician may refer you to a dermatologist if they come across anything concerning, but it's encouraged to schedule an appointment with a health professional you trust, whether that's your physician or dermatologist.

Does a higher SPF mean more protection?

According to the MD Anderson Cancer Center at the University of Texas, SPF 15 sunscreen blocks 93% of UVB radiation, and SPF 30 blocks 97%. After that, the difference in protection is small. SPF 50 blocks 98%, and SPF 100 stops 99% of UVB rays from reaching your skin. No matter what SPF you choose, be sure to reapply often and use enough to cover all parts of your body thoroughly.

MOVING FORWARD WITH TECHNOLOGY

With the assistance of the Friends of the Library, two new computers were purchased in December, 2024.

The five year old patron computer was replaced with a new Dell desktop computer and monitor with the Microsoft suite of products, internet access and security software.

The staff circulation computer was also replaced with a new Dell desktop computer and touchscreen monitor. The old monitor was saved for future use. In April, two more patron computers will be replaced with computers purchased with a matching General Technology Grant from the South Central Kansas Library System. Library Board Treasurer Cindy Claassen filed that successful grant application on behalf of the Library and the monitor saved from December's computer replacement will be used with one of the new patron computers arriving in April.

We are currently in negotiations for a new multi-function printer from Konica Minolta to replace the current machine, for which parts are no longer available.

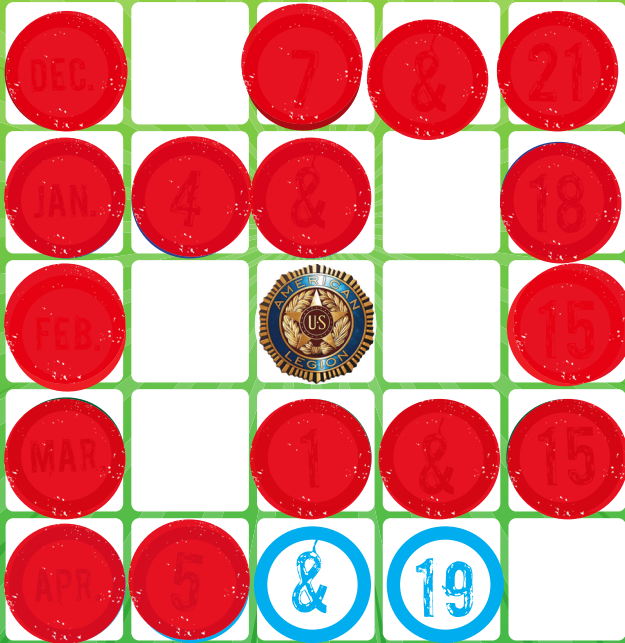

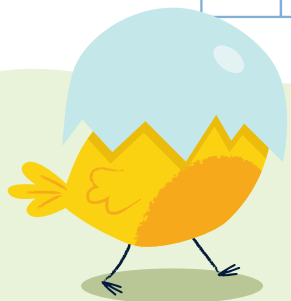
